CONFERENCE THEME

The 20th Ludwig-Harms-Symposium, organized by the Ludwig-Harms Board of Trustees, is dedicated to a mission-historical topic that seems to have been dealt with sufficiently in the debates of the 1970s to -90s. But previous symposiums never have tackled that topic, let alone under the theoretical approach of “history of entanglements”.

“Colonialism and mission” is a relational pair of terms that raises questions about the most diverse circumstances that need to be clarified and understood: in historical, global, regional political, social, post-colonial, ethical, international law, cultural anthropology, religious studies and, last but not least, mission studies. With these questions expectations are raised and kept alive to methodically clarify injustices of considerable extent that have occurred. The respective categories mentioned - even when applied from an interdisciplinary perspective - make many things explainable but leave others in the dark.

In addition, terms such as “encounter” and “interaction” must be added, more openly and less judgmental. In the history of mission these terms have been used in the most different forms. To trace here the multitude of “history of entanglements” in an exemplary way can lead to new insights.
